Whereas the GREAT REPUBLIC, a Weekly newspaper published in Washington, D.C., was adopted by the National Convention of the G.A.R. on the 22nd day of November, 1866, I therefore would call the especial attention of every post of the Grand Army of the Republic to its merits. It will devote all the space required to the Order, and the publishers will be thankful for any information of interest. Each Post therefore is requested to give a synopsis of its proceedings, far as they are of a public nature. I would recommend every post to subscribe 1 one or more copies dating back to No. 11, Vol. 1, which contains the proceedings of the first National Convention, together with the constitution then adopted. The wider the circulation of the paper the more perfectly the principles of the Order will be understood and appreciated. I would earnestly request all members of the Army to use every effort to extend the circulation of our very able organ.

ATTENTION GRAND ARMY

The Grand Army Badge Manufacturing Company, of LaFayette, Indiana, is authorized by Special Order No. 10 of January 5, 1867, as the exclusive manufacturers of the National Emblem of the G.A.R., and are now ready to fill orders for Badges at the following retail prices;

- Silver-plated badges, warranted for five years ..... .75
- Gold-plated Badges.....\$1.50
- Silver Badges, with hinge pin.....\$1.75
- Genuine Gold Badges, warranted 18 carats fine, engraved with name & c. to order..... \$6.00

The members of this Company are in good standing in the G.A.R., and pledged to employ none but crippled or disabled soldiers, who are in like standing, and are recommended by their Post Commanders, as their agents. To such we give a large per cent., which, added to the fact that we donate ten per cent. of all sales to General Headquarters for charitable purposes, leaves the company but a small interest on capital invested, and it is hoped that our comrades will respond fully to our efforts to provide them with the Emblem of the Order. Those wishing to act as agents should write for circular, sending stamp. Small orders must be accompanied by cash. Large orders will be filled C.O.D.

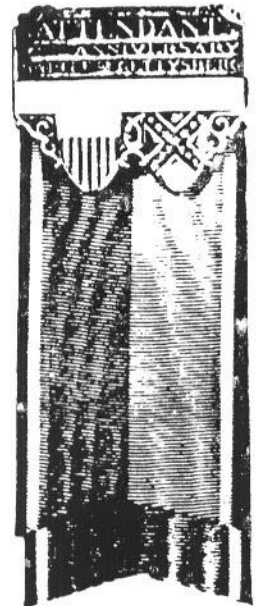

Measures have been taken by the G.A.R. Badge Company to secure a patent for their design, which is adopted as the Badge of the Order, which design is shown by a cut in this paper, and all persons are hereby forbidden to manufacture or sell any Badge, pin, or other article of jewelry bearing such emblems, unless authorized by this Company.

A. Orth Behm was one of the committee appointed to design the first badge of the GAR. General Julius Webber, of Springfield, and Major O.M. Wilson, of Indianapolis, were the other members of the committee. Very little is known of A. Orth Behm. He and his brother, G.O. Behm, were attorneys at law, their law office located at Main Street, between 3rd. and 4th., LaFayette, Indiana. A search of records stored in the Tipticannoe County Historical Association turned up nothing about the Grand Army Badge Company or the Behm law practice. The building that housed the law offices has been torn down and Behms house is no longer standing. A major step in tracing the early badge could be made, if the records of the Grand Army Badge Company are discovered. In the next issue of the GREAT REPUBLIC the second ad of the Grand Army Badge Company will be printed.

Official badges were issued for the veterans and attendants. Other badges were issued for Champion Band, Championship Drum Corps, Members of the Pe Commission, Distinguished Guests, Boy Scouts, and Ushers.

Next issue will picture the remaining four badges.

The total attendance at the reunion was 1845 Union Confederate veterans. Texas had the highest number v 130.

Each Union veteran was presented with a silk American mounted on a black staff with a bronze tip. This flag ha thirty-four stars representing the states of the North pating in the Civil War. Each Confederate veteran recei silk Confederate flag mounted on a black staff with a b tip.

## BOOK REVIEWS

## NEW ENGLAND'S LAST CIVIL WAR VETERANS by Jay S Hoar, Published by Seacliff Press, Arlington, Texas, 1976.

A new Civil War book is anything but an unusual event, with many published every year. It seems such a contrast that while Civil War books flourish, books about the veterans after the war are almost non-existent. Contemporary books on the veterans are rare, and for the GAR or UCV historian, anything is an encouragement that this era of the Civil War soldiers life is now being studied and documented.

Mr. Hoar's book is as he admits, "a first limited sub-study for a further work on a national level, *Sunset and Dusk of the Blue and the Gray*." While the primary information is of New England veterans, much is included on the national level. The appendices have New England membership lists and post designations, but also have national membership records of the GAR. Other charts list the last surviving soldiers in each state, the last 100 Civil War veterans, and forty of the oldest veterans among the last.

I personally found the chapter with the interview of James M. Lurvey to be the most interesting. Mr. Lurvey was the last veteran in New England, and the interview took place in 1955, when the author was sixteen years old. How many of us had the opportunity to see or talk with a Civil War veteran. It should remind us that there are still many persons who attended GAR encampments, and these interviews can still be made.

Mr. Hoar states in his advertising, "An unpublished chapter in American history long overdue. Apparently unobtainable in any single reference work, the material here offered the casual reader, the Civil War buff, or the historian is the result of a synthesis of widely scattered and, it would seem, fast-fading information."

This book should be in every Civil War library, and is a must for every GAR historian. Orders may be placed directly with the author and he will autograph your copy if asked.

The 35th. national encampment convened in the city of Cleveland, Ohio, September 12, 13, 1901, with Commander in Chief Leo Rassieur presiding. Membership was 269,507. During this encampment, President William McKinley was shot and killed in the city of Buffalo. Ex-Pres. Benjamin Harrison died on March 13. He was a member of the G.A.R. Election of officers gave the honor of commander in chief to Bill Torrance, of Minnesota.

The following is from the 35th. National Encampment Journal.

The first meeting of the committee on badges was held June 14, and the question of selecting badges that would be original in design and reflect credit on the city of Cleveland was carefully discussed in detail. A number of designs were held from time to time and numerous designs and estimates were considered.

Mr. A. Schwaab of the Schwaab Stamp & Seal Company of Milwaukee, visited Cleveland, met with the Committee several times and submitted designs and estimates which the committee finally approved. The executive committee was therefore recommended to make a contract with the Schwaab Stamp & Seal Company for all badges except the delegate badges for the Woman's Relief Corps and the Ladies of the G.A.R., which were made by Fenton & Stair of this city. To this Milwaukee Company was also granted the exclusive privilege of making and of selling on the streets of Cleveland and elsewhere during encampment week the official souvenir badge, the design of which had been fully endorsed and approved.

POST OFFICERS BADGES

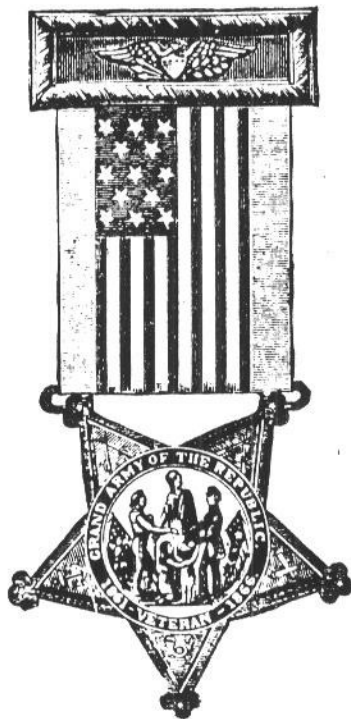
During the 7th. National Encampment in New Haven, 1873, a committee was formed to act on a proposition from A.B. Underwood. He had submitted a proposition for an official badge to designate rank in the GAR. The committee, which included A.B. Underwood, Charles Burrows, and C.A. Wells, reported back to the encampment the next day with this recommendation.

*New Haven, May 14, 1873*

To the Commander-in-Chief:

Sir: The committee of this Encampment to whom was referred the resolution of the Council of Administration of Massachusetts, relating to the adoption of an official badge, respectfully report that they recommend the adoption, by this Encampment, of a badge contemplated by Section 2, Article IX, Chapter V, of the Rules and Regulation, which may be worn by all officers in the Grand Army of the Republic, when on duty as such, or on occasions of ceremony

The report was moved and adopted by the Encampment.



The following description is of the officers badge as it applies to the Post Officers.

**Miniature rank strap**

The miniature rank strap is to be one and one-half inches in length, one-half inch in width, enamelled dark blue, with a border one-sixteenth of an inch in width, of gold or gilt, and on it be insignia of official position in the GAR, making use of the familiar symbols of the old service, substantially as determined by the National Council of Administration, and in Circular No. 6. 1869.

**Ribbon**

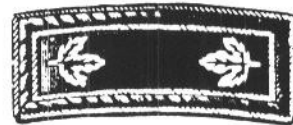
The ribbon is to be one and one-half inches in length in the center and one and one-fourth inches in width. The ribbon for Post Officers shall be light blue.

Regulations and Ritual reported favorably on the proposition for incorporation of the flag-ribbon on the membership and officer badges. This change took place Sept. 28, 1887, at the

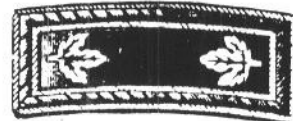

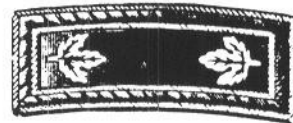
COMMANDER..... Silver eagle

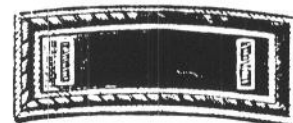

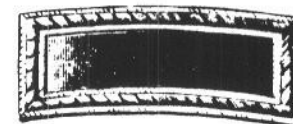

**Post Officers Badges- Continued.**

21st. Encampment. Early examples of this flag ribbon show the flag sewn on the solid ribbon. This was possibly because of the supply slowness in issue of the new ribbon.

**Membership Star**

From the ribbon was pendant the bronze star of the membership badge. This membership star design changed during the years and will be dealt with in later issues. The wider shank was designed for the officers version to accommodate the wider ribbon. Earlier examples of adopting the wider ribbon vary, but this was standardized to the wider wire hanger attached at the outside of the top points of the star. (see cut on page five.)

**Secretary to Post**

In the later years of the GAR, when the veterans were having a difficult time running the posts, the WRC and Sons of Veterans were there to assist. A post pin badge was designed for the secretary to the post. The following communication describes the pin badge.

September 15, 1927

**COMMITTEE ON RULES AND REGULATIONS****SONS OF VETERANS**

Be it enacted, That Posts in the several Departments may admit the Sons of Veterans at their option, To meeting of said Posts, but not to Participate in any of the proceedings by vote or otherwise, They can be engaged by the Posts to act as Secretary if so desired.

*Small Bar Pin marked "Sec'y G.A.R. Post" will be furnished*

The pin bar was a bronze bar with a ribbon keeper on the reverse. Most pins found have the Post flag ribbon (blue edged) attached.
