

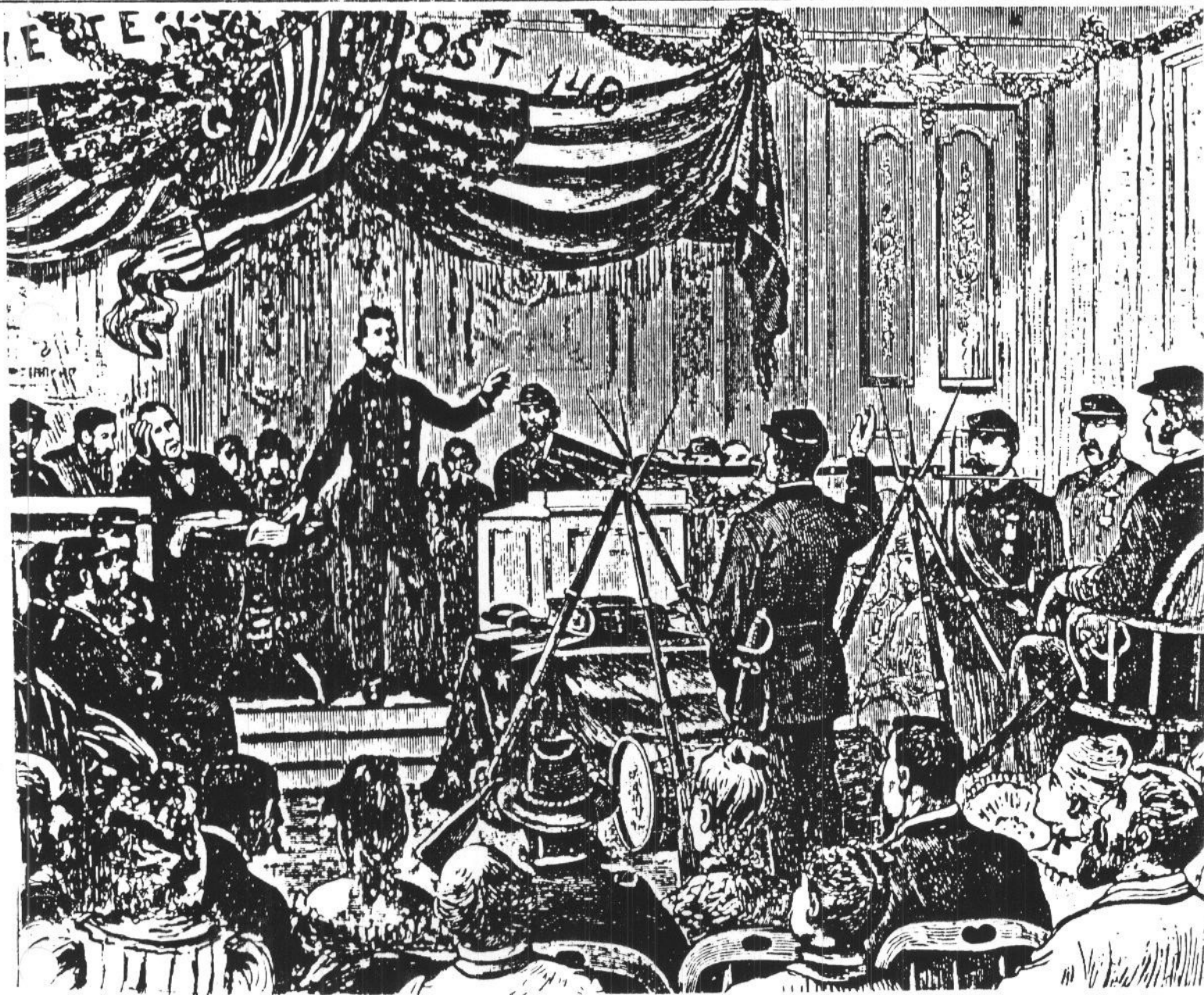

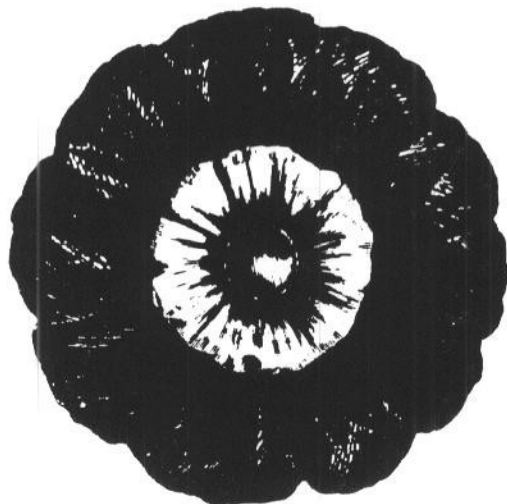

The following circular is in the collection of Warren Barber. He has graciously allowed it to be copied for publication.

The first mention of a G.A.R. ribbon badge was during the 2nd. National Encampment in Philadelphia. The following comment is from the proceedings of the Encampment.

*"Comrade A.S. Cushman, of Massachusetts, Chairman of the Committee on Ritual presented a design for a badge to be worn at the funerals of Comrades, which was adopted."*

January 16, 1868.

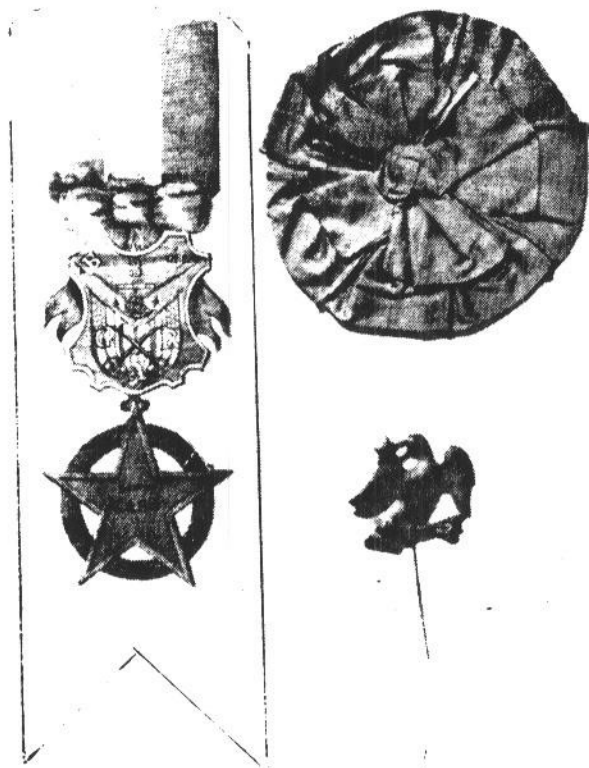

The 3BN-GAR badge below is in the collection of Roger L. Heiple and is marked Dep't of Mass. David Klinepeter also has the ribbon marked Dep't of Penna. These badges have been an unsolved problem for both collectors. It can now be certain that they are the first ribbons and mourning badge of the G. R. The ribbon was to be worn on all public occasions and most likely worn by the delegates at both Department & National Encampments. Their use would have included the years of 1868 and 1869, for the design was changed in the Special Session of the National Encampment in New York, October, 1869.



During the period of the adoption of the ribbon badge, a Certificate of Membership was described in a circular from N. P. Chipman.

The accompanying design, prepared by Comrade Harry H. Davis, of Pennsylvania, has been adopted for the Certificates of Membership in the Grand Army.

The seal of the Department ordering them will appear in the centre of the left border. Departments over two thousand strong will designate the soldier or sailor to represent them on the upper right medallion. Smaller Departments will be furnished with a list of representative comrades to select from. These changes, with the name of the Department, are all the plate will admit of.

The Certificates are furnished to comrades through the regular channels of the Army at the following prices.

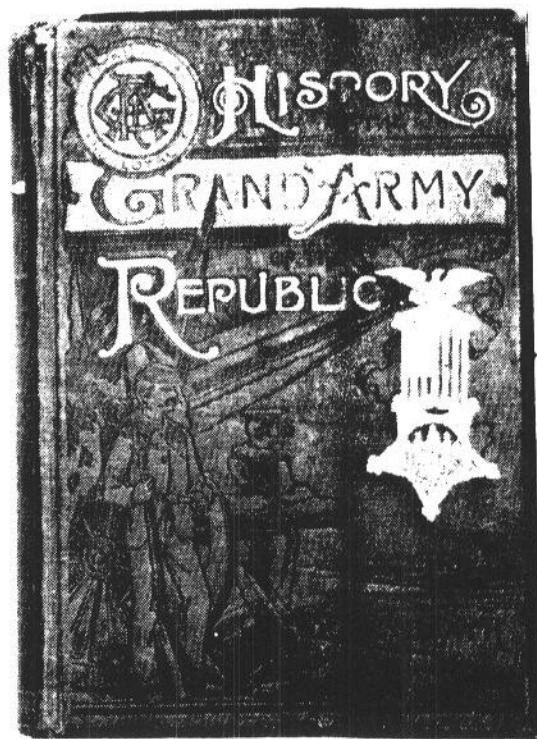

## BOOK REVIEWS

**HISTORY OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC**  
by Robert B. Beath, Published by Bryan, Taylor & Co, N.Y.,  
1888, 702 pages, illustrated.



If you are interested in GAR history of collecting, this is your book. It is a must, for it contains the most complete early history of the GAR written. Starting with the early veteran societies and army groups, Mr. Beath traces their history to the organization of the G.A.R. With the best collection of early papers, he describes the first meetings and 1st. National of the G.A.R. His massive effort to assemble the early papers have not been without criticism. Many of the veterans used to refer to the 'History' as 'History according to Beath.'

Illustrations include:

Corps badges  
Membership badges of the WRC, GAR, SV, Loyal Legion, UVL, Army of the Tennessee, Army of the Potomac, Army of the Cumberland, Signal Corps. Plates of Past Commanders and early members of the GAR.

Because the book was written in 1888, the record of the National Encampments is only through the administration of John P. Rea, Twenty Second annual session, 1888.

Prices vary widely, with the lowest around \$10.00 and the highest in the range of \$45.00. Of course the condition has much to do with the price. I would consider \$15.00 to \$20 a fair price, and would only pay higher for an excellent copy or one that is inscribed.

The 48th. National Encampment met in Detroit, Sept. 3 and 4, 1914, with Commander in Chief Washington Gardner presiding. The membership had dropped to 171,335 at this time with 990 voting delegates present. Comrade David Palmer, of Iowa, was elected Commander in chief.

A number of the Delegate medals have been found to broken the loop at the top of the medallion. This is pointed out by the reference in the Journal.

*Comrade Stowits. I wish to say to the comrades that whoever have lost the medallions of the badge, if you will present your badges to the quartermaster general's office in the Pontchartrain Hotel, national headquarters, we will endeavor to get you a perfect badge in its place, but you must surrender the badge that you have.*

The Memorial Hymn,  
Published 1870 by S. M. Tinkham and Sons.

This hymn was written two years following the publication of Logan's General Order, No. 11, and is considered the first of many GAR related hymns and songs. The connection between the hymn and the No. 11 order is evident. The original copy is in the collection of Roger Heiple.

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I. MEMORIAL DAY was first directed to be observed by the Grand Army of the Republic by Commander-in-Chief John A. Logan, in the following general order:

HEAD-QUARTERS GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC,  
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5, 1868.

*General Order, No. 11.*

I. The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defence of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet church-yard in the land. In this observance no form of ceremony is prescribed, but Posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

We are organized, comrades, as our Regulations tell us, for the purpose, among other things, "of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors, and marines who united to suppress the late rebellion." What can aid more to assure this result than by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between our country and its foes? Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their deaths the tattoo of rebellious tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the nation can add to their adornment and security is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds. Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no vandalism of avarice or neglect, no ravages of time testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic.

If other eyes grow dull and other hands slack, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain to us.

Let us, then, at the time appointed gather around their sacred remains and garland the passionless mounds above them with the choicest flowers of spring-time; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us, a sacred charge upon a nation's gratitude,—the soldier's and sailor's widow and orphan.

II. It is the purpose of the Commander-in-Chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope that it will be kept up from year to year while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades. He earnestly desires the public press to call attention to this Order, and lend its friendly aid in bringing it to the notice of comrades in all parts of the country in time for simultaneous compliance therewith.

III. Department Commanders will use every effort to make this Order effective.

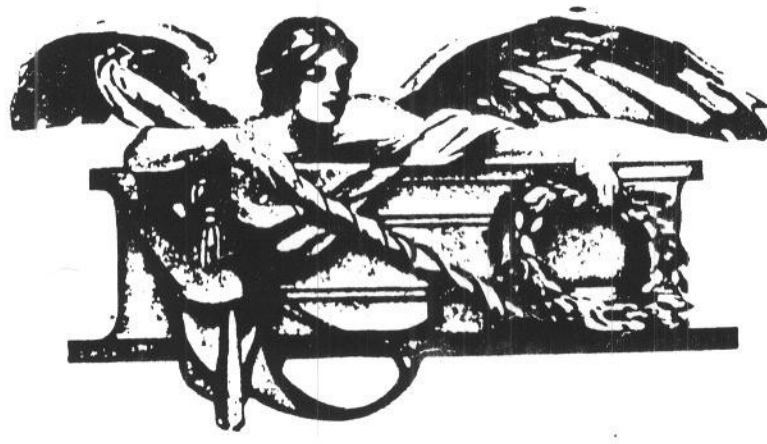
G.A.R. COLLECTING HEADLINES PAPER

ADVERTISING CIRCULAR FOUND IN DES MOINES

A research trip to Des Moine proved to be quite worthwhile. An advertising circular was discovered in the post records at the State Library. It described an unusual pin of the GAR. This lapel pin is made of brass with a dark copper color. The top of the pin is removable, and when it is removed a colored piece of cloth is inserted. The colors are as follows: Blue- infantry, Red- artillery, Yellow- cavalry.

Around the edge of the pin is the inscription, "Grand Army of the Republic - Veteran 1861 - 1866." The five branches of service are represented with symbols between the points of the star.

Only one example is known to exist at this time, so it can be assumed that it never became popular.

The color indicates the branch of service of the wearer—blue for infantry, red for artillery, yellow for cavalry. It is handsomely made of copper bronze, and so arranged that the color can be changed or renewed instantly. It is pre-eminently and distinctively a Grand Army design, and acknowledged by all comrades who have seen it to be the most handsome and appropriate that has been devised.

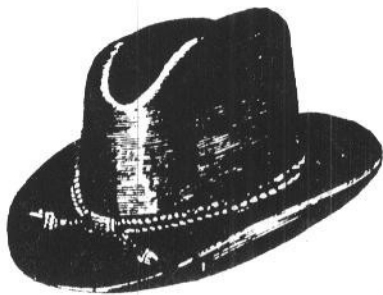

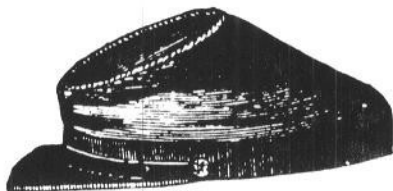

QUEEN ADJUSTABLE BUTTONS

Cut 1 Represents the button as it appears when attached.

Cut 2 Shows the back open for adjustment.

Cut 3 Shows the back closed after adjustment.

To fasten insert the button within the open shell, then by means of the little knob move the slide around to position shown in Cut 3. The button will then remain securely in position.

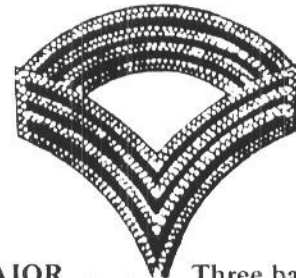
